

TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship Purpose

The TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship provides financial support to Crowder College TRIO participants who take Crowder College dual credit classes.

TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

- Must be a current junior or senior participant in Crowder College, Talent Search, Upward Bound, or Upward Bound Math/Science TRIO Pre-college Programs
- Must be enrolled in a Crowder College dual credit class
- Must have a cumulative high school grade point average of 3.0 or better
- Must be a current junior or senior in high school

TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship Amount

The TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship is equal to tuition for one dual credit course up to five credits. It is non-renewable. Applicants must apply each semester.

Awards

The TRIO Dual Credit Scholarship will be applied to your Crowder College account.

To Apply

- Complete the attached application and return it to the TRIO Director's office by **12:00 noon on September 15th, for fall scholarships or February 15th, for spring scholarships**. Note that if either date falls on a weekend, the completed application is due the next business day the College is open. With the completed application please:
 - Submit a high school **class schedule** and **indicate** the dual credit course.
 - Submit a high school **transcript** which will be used to determine cumulative GPA.
 - Submit the **essay** as stated on the application.
 - You will receive an email from the scholarship committee, indicating whether all of your information has been received or if there are missing documents.
